New Graphic Novel Program



Joe Sacco's novel *Palestine* n only provided a unique glimp everyday the lives Palestinians under occupation, b also introduced the world to powerful new medium of stor telling, sort of graphica illustrated journalism. With $W\epsilon$ Bank Stories: The Graphic Nove Project Hope helped to create t first ever graphic Palestinians, thereby putting t

powerful representational tools of this art form in the hands of Palestinian youth.

Building on the success of this first novel, Proje Hope has initiated a new Graphic Novel program train a group of youth in the techniques of grapl novel production. The program is off to a great sta with 17 local youth participating as students. great thing about this project is that these youth a not only learning graphic novel design, but also a education, enabling them to go back to their hon communities and replicate the course with children there. By this summer, we hope to have at least dozen graphic novel classes being taught by you for youth in villages, neighbourhoods and refug camps in the Nablus area. We look forward sharing the spectacular results of this project w you when the stories are published by the end of t year, with the best being selected for publication in new graphic novel and children's pieces postonline.

After three years, Project Hope's Bridge to the World (B2W) youth-blogging program is officially coming to an end. However, that won't mean the end of Project Hope's commitment to facilitating cross-cultural communication and international understanding. Indeed, as mentioned above, our free B2W Net Café aims to continue to keep kids connected with the world through the Internet, social networking and blogging.

Towards this goal, Project Hope ran a short 2-week photography and film course for Balata youth who participate in the B2W blog program. The students learned how to tell stories through digital photographs and video. Now, students are learning how to upload and share their stories with the world through their blogs. New English Language Community Centre and Net Lab



Project Hope now offers progressive levels English language classes its new English commun centre. These classes a open to adults of all ag at an affordable subsidizate to cover mater expenses, with classes for children and you remaining free, as always Classes consist of a hours of instruction over

period of 2 months. Project Hope continues to be leader in local community English education in Nabl by emphasizing real-world language use a conversation with native English speakers. Ov 1000 students participate in Project Hope class every month through its community outrea program that offers free English classes community centres serving underprivileged areas.

As part of a holistic approach to learning, Proje Hope is also teaching English and computers in new computer lab and Net Café. Currently, beginning computer classes and 6 blogs classes a running with over 160 students participating in t program. Project Hope provides transportation f students to and from the refugee camps to be alto use the centre's computers and Internet.

Project Hope wants to provide a special thanks to its friends at the **Dundee-Nablus Twinning** Association (DNTA) for their support with a recent exchange, hosting local Palestinian volunteers Rami and Rafig on a recent exchange to Scotland from October 2010 to January 2011. Unfortunately soon upon their arrival in Scotland, the supporting partner organization the Edinburgh University Settlement (EUS) went bankrupt and took the funding raised for the project into bankruptcy. The EUS was also planning to coordinate the project for 6 months. The DNTA literally saved and salvaged the trip for these Rami and Rafiq, raising funds for and hosting them in Dundee for a three month period.

Recent Events in Support of Project Hope in Canada and Australia

Australia (Feb 2011) - Former volunteer Michael Coleman's non-profit organization <u>Dark Corners</u> ran a <u>fundraising dinner</u> for material for Project Hope's activities. It was held at "The Commons," a restaurant and bar in Dalinghurst, Sydney. 52 people attended and raised \$1 830 (\$AUS).

Canada (Mar 2011) - Anaïs Barbeau-Lavalette's documentary <u>Se souvenir</u> <u>des cendres had a charity screening</u> in Montreal at Cinéma Beaubien where a good turnout led to \$305 (\$CAD) being raised for Project Hope.

As Nablus continues to enjoy a period of relati calm, Project Hope is making great efforts to rea out to communities that continue to be choked checkpoints, suffer settlement encroachment, endure a lack of social services due to restrictio imposed by the occupation. We are current developing cooperative relationships with commun organizations in Hebron, Tulkarem, Jenin, and ru areas near Nablus that need international voluntee to run programs for children and youth. currently recruiting skilled volunteers to come out f one-month volunteer stints working locations, as well as in Nablus' refugee camps. addition, we're recruiting long-term voluntee especially those who are skilled in English langua education, computing, and digital media, to volunte as instructors in Nablus.

We have restructured our volunteer programs that groups of volunteers arrive during a designat week to undergo group training in preparation f their volunteer experience, as well as getting a gro debriefing to prep them for their next phase volunteering: going home and raising awareness.
